To use the internet safely to answer specific questions.	<p>Model using child-friendly search engines.</p> <p>Establish that it is better to type specific information into search engines.</p> <p>Teach children to minimise the screen or use a screen protector.</p> <p>Model using a range of digital resources where possible, e.g. laptops/ PCs/iPads.</p>	<p>What should we do if we find something unexpected that we do not like?</p> <p>What should we do if we find something unexpected that we do not like?</p>	<p><a href="http://www.safesearchkids.com/">http://www.safesearchkids.com/</a></p> <p><a href="http://www.kidrex.org/">http://www.kidrex.org/</a></p> <p><a href="#">Hector Protector</a> (used to cover the screen if children find something they think maybe unsafe).</p> <p>Search for any child friendly websites related to class topics to direct children towards.</p>

<b>Communication &amp; Collaboration</b>			
To know the difference between forms of digital communication.	<p>Teach that passwords for email and other online accounts should be kept safe.</p> <p>Establish when different forms of communication might be the most suitable.</p> <p>Teach that children should never communicate online without the consent of a teacher/parent.</p>	<p><i>Is it ever ok to share your password with anyone?</i></p> <p><i>When might you send an email or message?</i></p> <p><i>What is an online chat room? Do children ever use these?</i> E.g. within games.</p>	<p>Explore forms of online communication in school, e.g. class emails, web cams, video calls, messaging systems.</p> <p>Use paper templates for children to practise using different forms of communication.</p> <p>Use drama in the classroom to perform different types of communication.</p>
To be aware of the risks associated with different forms of communication.	<p>Establish that many people are on the internet and not everyone is kind.</p> <p>Teach that children should only communicate with people they know in real life and only with the permission of a teacher/parent.</p> <p>Teach that emails from strangers might include viruses that will harm your computer.</p>	<p><i>What should you do if you get an email or message from a stranger, even if it is on a game?</i></p>	<p>Use drama in the classroom to act out receiving emails and messages from known/unknown people.</p> <p>Create card with scenarios to sort into whether messages should be opened/ responded to/ when to ask an adult for help.</p> <p>Come up with a list of rules for communicating that children can take home.</p>
To understand why it is important to be kind online.			

To know how to respond when people are not kind and polite online.			
<b>E-Awareness</b>			
To understand what personal information is and why it is unique to us.	<p>Know that some information (full name, address, birthday, school) is special as it applies to them.</p> <p>Elicit that personal information is as valuable online as offline and that it should not be shared without a parent, carer or teacher's permission.</p>	<p>What is personal information?</p>	<p>CEOP Thinkuknow resources, based on Hector's World. <a href="http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/5_7/">www.thinkuknow.co.uk/5_7/</a> lesson 1 - personal information is special <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=M-njh8mFvVk">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=M-njh8mFvVk</a> -not sharing personal information (Lion King clip)</p> <p>Make a diary of personal information.</p>
To identify characteristics of people who are worthy of their trust.	<p>Establish and identify characteristics of people who are worthy of their trust.</p> <p>Teach that that not everyone online is trustworthy and that they should not talk to people that they do not know and trust in real life.</p> <p>Teach that children should tell an adult if someone talks to them online and teach ways for dealing with contact from strangers.</p>	<p>How would you know if someone is trustworthy?</p> <p>How are you trustworthy?</p> <p>Is it possible to meet someone online? Can they ever be trustworthy?</p>	<p>CEOP Thinkuknow resources, based on Hector's World. <a href="http://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/5_7/">www.thinkuknow.co.uk/5_7/</a> lesson 2 - not everyone is trustworthy lesson 3 - assessing trustworthiness</p> <p>Through PSHE/ circle time, make paper chains of characteristics of trustworthiness.</p> <p>Come up with rules for communicating on the internet.</p> <p>Discuss what to do if a stranger talks to you on the internet and wants to know your personal information. Come up with a class bank of ways to tell that person no.</p> <p>Use drama to practise the above, pretend to save the messages and show an adult.</p>
