Writing:

Reading:

Liturgy

Children will learn about prayer, psalms, silence, music, ritual, symbols, sacraments, the structure of liturgy, the purpose, place and different styles of worship.

THEME

Theme name: Long Live the Queen

Subject Driver: History

In this theme, in **History**, children will learn about the Victorians. They will learn about what life was like in a Victorian classroom and the workhouse and will learn all about Queen Victoria. They will also investigate famous inventors and inventions that happened during this period. In **Geography**, children will learn to name and locate counties and cities of the United Kingdom. In **Science**, children will learn about electricity and electrical safety. They will learn to associate the brightness of a lamp with the number of cells in a circuit before exploring the use of symbols and diagrams to represent circuits. The children will learn to perform and play Victorian compositions in **Music**. In **Design and Technology**, children will be given the opportunity to create their own torches. Children will need to complete their own research and develop their ideas before creating their own product. Finally, they will evaluate their product against their original design criteria.
