

- 1) Write a short (400-500 words) analysis of the presentation of the protagonist in 'The Yellow Wallpaper' by Charlotte Perkins Gilman.
- 2) Write a piece of creative writing (400-500 words) inspired by 'The Yellow Wallpaper'. Your writing can take the form of a poem, some prose, a news article, a letter, or any other form of fiction or nonfiction.

Your starting points:

- Read 'The Yellow Wallpaper'
- Research the life and writing of Charlotte Perkins Gilman
- Closely analyse the presentation of the protagonist through the writer's use of language, form and structure
- Examine the contexts of 'The Yellow Wallpaper': social factors, historical factors, cultural factors and political factors.
- Consider different critical lenses you could view the story through Feminist? Marxist? Psychoanalytical?
- Create a detailed plan for your essay 2 main points.
- Draft and then carefully redraft to perfect your written outcome before submission.
- Plan your creative piece, refining your use of structure and reflecting on your intended purpose and audience.
- Draft and redraft your writing, considering carefully the effect of your words.
