


OPTION GUIDANCE

You have reached an important time in your life where you will make some important decisions for the next three years.....

**How will you choose what subjects to study?
How will you decide what courses are right for you?**

DON'T PANIC... Complete some simple quizzes to help you choose well...

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- ☺ Education and training are vital to your future success. The number of jobs for poorly qualified, unskilled people are shrinking quickly.
 - ☺ Your education and training will continue until you are eighteen, which will help you to gain the knowledge, skills and qualifications you need.
 - ☺ Involve your parents/carers. Help them to understand what you are doing and how they can help you.
 - ☺ Speak to your subject teachers, Form Tutors or the Pastoral support department who can help you.

Plan How to Get Help and Support

As students get older they have more choice but with choice comes responsibility. In KS4 you, the student, will be able to choose some of the subjects you study but more will be expected of you in personal organisation and independent work.

So what will your Curriculum be in Years 9, 10 and 11?

1. In Key Stage 4 there are some subjects you must study at The Highcrest Academy. We call these subjects the 'Core' and they are English, Mathematics, Science and P.E. Pupils will study three separate Sciences in Physics, Chemistry and Biology. In English most students will also study English Literature. Maths has one GCSE for most. The PE lessons are not examined but will maintain your fitness and develop your skills across several sports. These core subjects make up 30 of 50 lessons per fortnight.
2. A PSHE/Citizenship lesson will also continue for all pupils. This will cover important topics of social and health education as well as religious, moral and ethical issues. It is not examined. (1 lesson per week).
3. You will then have 4 option choices. These will each be 3 lessons each week and this makes up the final 20 lessons of your fortnightly timetable. These options are grouped in 'blocks' and you must choose a subject from each block (2 from block B). The Options Grid will be given out and explained at the Options Evening on 13 March.
4. The Government is encouraging students to take an 'EBacc' combination of subjects and Universities are listing this in entrance requirements. We therefore will require that you choose one subject from either History, Geography or a Modern Foreign Language and if your ambition is to attend University we recommend you take a Modern Foreign Language.

The Examination Grades

All GCSEs from the 2019 examinations onwards will be graded using the new number system 9 to 1. 9 is the highest grade and will demand knowledge and skills above the current A*, 4 is equivalent to the current C grade but “good” passes are likely to be considered as 5 and above.

An alternative to GCSEs offered in some subjects is a BTEC or NCFE V certificates.

BTEC is a qualification offered by the Edexcel Exam Board. V certificates are offered by the exam board NCFE. A pass will be worth one 4 grade at GCSE, a merit is worth a 5/6 and a distinction an 8/9. In these qualifications tasks are set in a vocational (real world) context and you build up a folder of your work for assessment. The qualification will also include an externally set assessment which may be a written examination or in the form of an on-line test. They have very strict deadlines and you must be organised to meet these.

How you are tested may be something to consider when making your choices.

What is EBacc?

The Government have set a combination of subjects that they have called the “English Baccalaureate” which has become known as the “EBacc”.

These subjects are English, Maths, Double Science, History or Geography and a modern language. Students who attain a 4 grade or above in **all** these subjects will have attained an ‘EBacc’. The EBacc is becoming more well-known and may well become necessary for entry into University or other Higher Education. Students who are able to achieve these 4+ Grades should consider taking this range of subjects to keep future options open. Your tutor will discuss this with you. Highcrest requires students to take either, History, Geography or Computer Science and recommends a Modern Language. Again you may wish to discuss this with your tutor.

So what is the next step?

Take this booklet and the choices grid home. Spend a few days reading the booklet and speak to your teachers. Find out as much as you can. Talk with people at home and friends who have taken GCSE's.

Bring your Choices form back to the Year Manager's Office by **Friday 29 March 2019**. No allocations will be made before this date but forms handed in on time will be given priority over those that arrive late.

If we cannot accommodate everyone's first choice, we will use the average attainment grade from the March academic review.
