Aims of the Curriculum

- PSHE education is a school subject which aims for pupils to develop the knowledge, skills and attributes they need to keep themselves healthy and safe, and prepare for life and work in modern Britain.
- Our Programme of Study for PSHE education aims to develop the skills and attributes such as resilience, self-esteem, risk-management, team working and critical thinking,
- Evidence shows that well-delivered PSHE programmes have an impact on both academic and non-academic outcomes for pupils, particularly the most vulnerable and disadvantaged.
- The National Curriculum states that 'all schools should make provision for personal, social, health and economic education (PSHE), drawing on good practice'. (PSHE Association)
- PSHE education also contributes to the schools' statutory duties, outlined in the Education Act 2002 and the Academies Act 2010, to provide a balanced and broadly-based curriculum and is essential to Ofsted judgements in relation to personal development, behaviour, welfare and safeguarding (PSHE Association).

What are we trying to achieve?

PSHE education helps pupils to develop the knowledge, skills and attributes they need to manage many of the critical opportunities, challenges and responsibilities they will face as they grow up and in adulthood.

By teaching pupils to stay safe and healthy, and by building self-esteem, resilience and empathy, an effective PSHE programme can tackle barriers to learning, raise aspirations, and improve the life chances of all, including the most vulnerable and disadvantaged pupils.

There is evidence to show that PSHE education can address teenage pregnancy, substance misuse, unhealthy eating, lack of physical activity, and emotional health. The skills and attributes developed through PSHE education and through high quality Careers are also shown to increase academic attainment and attendance rates, particularly among pupils eligible for free school meals, as well as improve employability and boost social mobility

How do we organise our Curriculum?

Our curriculum is grouped into 5 core themes:

- **Health and Wellbeing** (Led by Maria Dunning-Mansell)
- **Literacy/PSD** (Led by Ellie Morley)
- **Citizenship/Financial Capability** (Led by Clair Mickleburgh)
- **Enterprise** (Led by Asim Qayyum- focus on KS4)
- **Careers Education-statutory** (Led by Lee Gordon, Level 6 qualified Careers Advisor)

These themes are delivered across 5 Challenge Days a year, by teams of specialised in-house staff, who focus on one theme to develop their knowledge, skills and understanding in order to have significant impact. Additionally this expertise is enhanced by the wider school curriculum and the use of outside experts from universities, employers, mental health charities, drugs charities, the School Nurse and NHS Sexual Health teams. As Careers Education is statutory, the team see all year groups each year and this is supplemented by themed group sessions, individual interviews, daily lunchtime drop-ins, individualised action plans, parental meetings, trips to universities, local colleges and employers and a week's work experience in Year 11.
