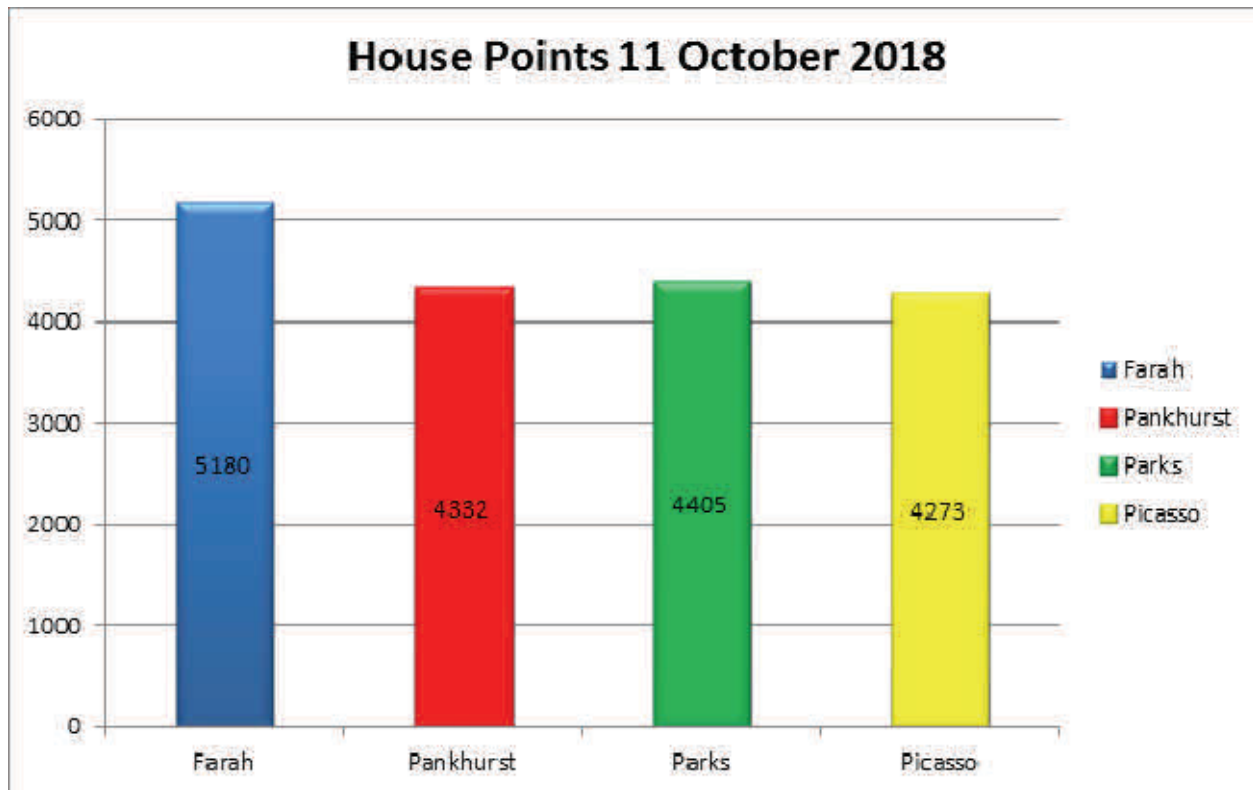


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School Awards

Stand Against Violence aims to prevent violence, its long-term consequences and the grief of losing loved ones by delivering violence prevention workshops and talks with young people. It was established in 2005 in response to the murder of 17 year-old Lloyd Fouracre, who was beaten to death by a group of drunken youths on his way home from a party.

On Wednesday 10 October Year 12 students were able to attend a workshop by the organisation. They found out that 50 million people are affected by violence each year and according to Stand Against Violence, a non-profit organisation trying to change this number—most of this is easily avoidable. They were told the harrowing story of 17 year old Lloyd, which impacted all of the students and demonstrated how 13 years later snap decisions can still be affecting people. We discussed strategies to minimise the risks to ourselves such as being aware, not drinking to excess and making sure that someone knows where you are at all times. It was a sad and thought provoking afternoon but I think we can all take many positives from the experience.

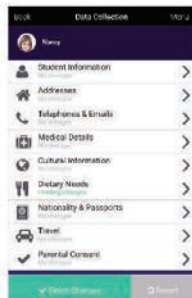

A proposed 20 mph limit aims to make roads safer for children.

Have your say on plans to introduce a borough wide 20mph limit in Richmond upon Thames. Earlier this year the Council announced its intention to reduce the speed limit on all roads (except the A316 and A2505 which are under the Transport for London red-route control to 20mph).

This speed limit would not only reduce vehicle speeds on our roads but evidence shows that it should reduce the number and severity of road accidents. This would make our roads safer for children and families walking or cycling to and from school each day.

Make sure you have your say on proposals that aim to make our roads safer and therefore encourage more families to be active. The deadline for feedback is Friday 21 July.
